Be God's Mirror

Have you ever looked into a mirror? What do you see? Your own reflection — smiling back when you smile, frowning when you frown. A mirror gives back exactly what it sees.

Kindness works much the same way.

When we speak gentle, thoughtful words — a simple "thank you," "please," "you've got this," or "can I help?" — it's like smiling into a mirror. We may not be on the receiving end of their kindness... but someone else might be.

May your week be filled with moments of kindness – given and received – like shining reflections of God's heart in the lives of those around you.



Seesaw Parent Communication



We are excited to share with you some important information about how we will be communicating your child's learning progress throughout the school year.

We will continue to use Seesaw as our primary platform to share timely and meaningful insights into your child's learning journey. This platform will allow you to view your child's progress regularly, and celebrate their growth and achievements as they happen.

Each term, your child's classroom teacher will post four individual learning updates to Seesaw:

- 2 posts from English
- 2 posts from Mathematics

Each post will include:

- A clear description of the task or learning activity.
- A comment from the teacher that provides specific feedback on your child's work and that clearly articulates your child's achievement.

In addition to classroom learning posts, specialist teachers (e.g. German, Health & Physical Education, Music) will contribute a minimum of two snapshot posts per term. These posts will also include an informative description of your child's year level experience in the specialist area.

This approach will continue to strengthen the connection between school and home by keeping you informed and engaged in your child's learning throughout the year.

If you haven't already, we encourage you to ensure you are connected to your child's Seesaw account so you don't miss any updates. Please feel free to reach out to the office if you need help setting this up.
