

#### When I Am Afraid...

This week in Chapel, our students will explore the powerful promise of Psalm 56:3:

"When I am afraid, I put my trust in You."

To bring this verse to life, I will share a simple science experiment. This experiment involves sprinkling pepper onto a bowl of water, letting it float on the surface. The pepper represents fear something we all experience, no matter our age. Then, I will gently touch the water with a finger coated in soap, and the students will see pepper will scatter instantly to the edges of the bowl. This is a powerful visual of what happens when God's presence meets our fear—fear flees.

Just as the soap brakes through the surface and pushes the pepper away, God's love and presence breaks into our lives when we feel overwhelmed. Fear may be part of being human, but it doesn't have to take hold. Trusting God doesn't mean pretending we're never afraid—it means knowing that we're never alone in it.

In the classroom and beyond, our children face moments of worry: a tricky friendship, a hard spelling word, a noisy playground, a new experience. This verse gives them a grounding truth they can carry with them: God is trustworthy, and He is near.

I encourage you to continue this conversation at home. Ask your child what they saw and felt during the pepper experiment. Revisit Psalm 56:3 together. And perhaps, the next time fear shows up—whether it's at bedtime or before a big day—you can gently remind them:

"When I am afraid, I will trust in You."

God is bigger than our fears. He is always close. He always loves us.

#### Year 6 HILS

On Tuesday, Week 6, the Year 6's visited Cornerstone College for HILS Day. They got to see classrooms, meet teachers, and try lessons there. There were five groups; each group assigned a timetable with four of seven various subjects to try. These were Science, Technology, Art, Drama, PE, Music, and Home Economics.

In Technology, students got to create with acrylic. They got to sand it, heat and bend it, drill holes in it, attach magnets and decorate with googly eyes. There were unique creations from keychains to fridge magnets to tacos!

In Drama, students got a backstage tour including seeing assorted props and costumes. They also got to participate in fun acting games which required them to use their creative thinking. Students also got the opportunity to try operating the onstage lights altering their colour and positioning!

In PE, students played a warm-up game before learning a new game called One Touch. They also got to learn a bit about what they would do in PE if they went to Cornerstone next year. This was the first HILS Day to include PE and students really enjoyed it!

In music, the Year 6's got full access to Guitar Band to make a from-scratch tune for a video. They also learnt about what happens when you press "A" on Guitar Band getting access to louder and quieter sounds and fading in or out. No one's tune sounded the same with there being over 30,000 loops for them to use!

In home economics, or home ec, for short they got to make a Hawaiian style pizza sub. They started by oiling the bread then they grated the cheese. After that they cut up mushrooms, pineapple, ham, tomato, onion and olives. After that they cut up some parsley to put on the sub and cooked it for 10 minutes. While the food was cooking, they did the dishes but when the sub and dishes were done, they enjoyed a wonderful pizza sub.

In science, they got to learn the pH levels of many liquids and solids. Some of the things they examined were flour, lemon juice, sugar, jelly crystals and laundry detergent. After they looked at all these they were told to look at static electricity by rubbing sticks made of different elements and balloons to try to get paper to fly on them. They did not use their heads to make the balloons static instead they used sheep's wool.

At St Mark's our learning is real life and so they would like to inform the St Mark's community of this upcoming event.

National Wattle Day is celebrated on September the first, which is the first day of spring. Through this special day, Australian's remember that there are over 1000 species of wattle. Golden wattle is the floral emblem of Australia.

The only place in the world that celebrates Wattle Day is Australia. Wattle Day is celebrated all throughout Australia.

Australia's identity is shown through this celebration because it tells us that our colours are green and gold. We get this from the stem of the wattle and the gold is from the bright yellow flower. It also shows that Australians have a fighting spirit like a wattle seed. Wattle seeds are the first to grow back after a bushfire as it also has very tough skin. We can survive through tough times.

To celebrate this special day, Australians dress in green or gold, or both. People might wear a sprig of wattle. Wattle seeds are also sometimes put in foods like cake and biscuits. Australians also sing songs or read poems about spring or Australia. They also plant wattle trees or do crafts or decorations featuring the wattle. They also go for a wattle walk. A wattle walk is when you go for a walk to collect pieces of different types of wattle. When you go for a walk, Australians also say, "Happy Wattle Day."

This Australian event has been celebrated and nationally recognised since 1992. It has been celebrated for 33 years. In 1910, New South Wales, Victoria and South Australia only celebrated it. The first idea for Wattle Day was in 1890.

Not everyone in Australia knows about Wattle Day. The golden wattle is one of the best known native Australian plants and is on Australia's Coat of Arms. First Nations Australians use it for food and medicine. They use the wood for digging sticks and clapping sticks.


