Faith Focus

When you look at people, what do you see? How do you see others?

In 1 Samuel 16 we read about how God spoke to Samuel and told him to go to the house of Jesse, a man from Bethlehem, and there he would find the next king of Israel. Looking over Jesse's sons, Samuel assumed the oldest son would be God's selection, after all he presumably looked like a king... impressive, tall and strong. But no, he was not the one. Jesse then proceeded to present 6 more of his sons but each one was rejected too. The youngest son, David was out in the fields watching the sheep, and was, by this Biblical account, dark and handsome with beautiful eyes. But it wasn't this reason that God chose David. In verse 17 we read, "The Lord doesn't see things the way you see them. People judge by the outward appearance but the Lord looks at the heart."

This story reminds us that when we look at others, we should try to see them as God sees them, with 'soft eyes', not judging others by how they look, how confident they seem or how important they appear. God deeply loves, knows and values us all.

God sees qualities such as kindness, faithfulness, humility, and trust in Him... things we cannot always see on the outside. Looking at others with God's eyes means treating everyone with respect, being open to seeing their strengths, and remembering that every person is created, valued and known by God, even when others do not notice them.

A few years ago I came across this quote, "Put on your God glasses every morning and see the world like God sees it."

We could broaden this quote a little considering 1 Samuel 16:7... "Put on your God glasses every morning and choose to see people the way God does, with soft eyes, not by what they look like on the outside, but by what is growing in their hearts."

For those of us who wear glasses, and even if you don't, as we physically put them on, or as we get up each day, I encourage us all to pray this very simple prayer... Lord, help us to look at hearts, not just appearances, seeing others the way You see them. Amen.

You are welcome to join us for Chapel tomorrow (Friday) morning at 9am where we will be exploring this idea of putting on our God glasses and seeing people the way God sees us.

PARKING RESTRICTIONS AT SCHOOLS ARE FOR THE SAFETY OF YOUR CHILDREN.

Local Councils impose a variety of parking restrictions at and near schools to achieve a safer environment for your children. These restrictions are also to optimise traffic movements and safety.

ROAD SIGNS

NO STOPPING ZONES

These zones are usually adjacent to school entrances and departure sides of school crossings.

You must not stop your vehicle in a no stopping zone or on a solid yellow line, not even for few seconds.



NO PARKING ZONES

You may stop in a No Parking zone to immediately pick up or set down your child and drive off as soon as possible.

No Parking zones are to ensure a quick and smooth turnover of vehicles.

You must not leave your vehicle parked or unattended. You must not wait and watch your child go into school from this zone. If you are going to collect your child from this zone, have your child wait nearby in the school grounds so they can see you arrive. On your arrival they can then leave the school grounds, enter your vehicle and then you can drive off.

(Do not wait in the zone if your child is not in sight).



PARKING RESTRICTIONS

CONTINUOUS WHITE CENTRE LINE

If a road has a continuous white centre line there must be 3 metres between the vehicle and the centre line.



INTERSECTION OR T-JUNCTION

You cannot park within 10m of any intersection due to sight restrictions.



FOOTPATHS OR NATURE STRIPS

Parking is prohibited at all times. It creates dangerous situations for pedestrians and other vehicles in the vicinity.



CROSSING PLACES (DRIVEWAYS)

You may park so that the front of your vehicle is level with the approach or the back is level with the departure side of a driveway to any property so that vehicles can enter and depart safely.



DOUBLE PARKING

Double parking creates dangerous situations anytime, however the danger is increased near schools especially when the children are entering or leaving school.



SCHOOL CROSSINGS

You cannot stop within 20m of the approach side or 10m of the departure side of a school crossing.



SPEED LIMITS

Speeding vehicles in a school zone are highly dangerous for children. There is a speed limit of 25kph, designated by the signs and zigzag line below, any time when children are present or when lights are flashing (depending on the type of crossing).
